From Hartford take exit 66. Turn left onto No. Colony Rd/US-5. Turn right onto Pent Highway. Turn left onto No. Plains Industrial Rd. Proceed to 101 No. Plains Industrial Rd, Harvest Park. We are a storefront located directly next to the Frame Shop. Parking is available in the back.

Merritt Pkwy North – Rte 15

From New Haven heading north, take exit 65 and make a slight left onto River Rd. Turn right onto Hall Ave/CT-150. Make a left on Washington St. Washington St will turn into No. Plains Industrial Road. Proceed to 101 No. Plains Industrial Rd, Harvest Park. We are a storefront located directly next to the Frame Shop. Parking is available in the back.

From Hartford: I-91

From Hartford heading south on I-91, take exit 15. Turn right onto Rte 68 and proceed for 2 miles. Turn left onto No. Plains Industrial Rd. Proceed to 101 No. Plains Industrial Rd, Harvest Park. We are a storefront located directly next to the Frame Shop. Parking is available in the back.

OUR PRESENTERS

Dennis Debbaudt is the father of a young man with autism and has been a professional investigator and journalist for 28 years. Over the past 11 years he has trained and developed training materials for law enforcement, first responders and criminal justice professionals throughout the U.S., Canada and the U.K.

Lisa Mitchell is a licensed clinical social worker who has worked in the field of developmental disabilities for 15 years, and specializes in the areas of psychotherapy and human sexuality education and training. She presently works at The Cody Center for Autism & Developmental Disabilities, where through the Sexuality Education and Reproductive Health Program, she provides short-term individual counseling, leads sexuality education groups, and offers community outreach and training.

Zosia Zaks is an adult with Aspergers Syndrome. Although she completed her master's degree in technical journalism from Polytechnic University in 2000 and held a variety of writing and editing jobs, it was various vocational and social challenges that led to her diagnosis at age 31. Currently she lectures and conducts workshops nationally on issues of importance to the autistic community; consults with families, couples, and adults on the spectrum to find ways to meet challenges based on autistic strengths; and serves on the Advisory Board of GRASP, the Global and Regional Asperger Syndrome Partnership.
